Aim #22: How did WWI come to an end?



- On November 11, 1918 at 11am (11/11/11), "the War to end all wars" is OVER!!! An **armistice** was signed.
- A huge reason the war came to end was because on April 6, 1917, the U.S. joined the Allies. This *turning point* changed the tide of war and enabled the Allies to defeat the Central Powers.
- For most of the war, the U.S. remained officially neutral as most Americans preferred to let Europeans settle their own differences.
- However, the U.S. loaned money & supplies to the Allies, which drew responses from Germanyunrestricted submarine warfare sank American ships traveling to Europe, carrying war materials. One example was the British passenger ship, the Lusitania, 128 Americans were killed. These attacks killed many American civilians and it angered many Americans.
- Americans were also outraged when details of the **Zimmerman telegram** were published in newspapers (Germany was trying to rally Mexico to attack the U.S.).
- The U.S. entry provided new supplies, fresh troops, and a huge morale boost for the Allies.
- Germany was going through internal problems such as running out of resources (metal) and food- the people seeing that the war was turning against them overthrew the Kaiser & set up a new government. In October 1918, the military finally admitted to itself that victory was impossible. The new leaders requested an armistice to end the war and asked for peace.
