Quiz: Debate

TASK: You will be split into two groups: 1 group to support a resolution (the affirmative side) and 1 group to oppose it (the negative side). In your groups, you will assign 1 person to make an opening statement and 1 student to make a closing statement. You will help each other get ideas, arguments, research, cross-questions, and rebuttals. You will then organize those ideas in a logical manner and assign roles to each student. Make sure you or your team members are not repetitive.

To complete this task, you must:

- Work together as a group to assemble your best historically-based, logical arguments
- Articulate arguments FOR or AGAINST the resolution
- For each argument/reason, provide ONE piece of evidence to support your argument
- Explain/analyze the logical implications of that piece of evidence AND the argument
- The Opening statement will simply lay out your team's position and overview of how you're going to defend that position.
- The Closing statement will provide a recap of your position, but must also include points/questions/rebuttals brought up by both teams throughout the debate.
- Each team must be prepared to come with cross-examine questions.

FORMAT OF DEBATE: (20 minutes total)

- 1. Opening Statements [1 minute each] Affirmative side will go first, followed by the Negative side.
- 2. 3 arguments from Affirmative side will be presented (1 min. per student)
- 3. 3 arguments from Negative side will be presented, but must include rebuttals (1 min. per student).
- 4. Additional # of arguments from Affirmative side will be presented, but must include rebuttals (1 min. per student)
- 5. Additional #_____ of arguments from Negative side will be presented, but must include rebuttals (1 min. per student)
- 6. Negative side will cross-examine the other side
- 7. Affirmative side must respond to the question presented and cross-examine the other side
- 8. Negative side must respond to the questions presented and cross-examine the other side
- 9. Repeat steps 6-9 until judge is ready for closing statements
- 10. Affirmative side will present closing statement (1 min.)
- 11. Negative side will present closing statement (1 min.)
- 12. "Jury" will vote if resolution will pass.

How you will be assessed/graded:

- 1. Organization & Clarity: Main arguments and responses are outlined in a clear and orderly way.
- 2. Use of Argument: Specific reasons and historical evidence and facts are given to support or oppose the resolution. You must use content from class AND your own research.
- 3. Use of cross-examination and rebuttal: Identification of weakness in the other team's arguments and ability to defend itself against attack.
- 4. Each student must speak at least ONCE during the "debate" stage. (Your team will decide your role)
- 5. Each student demonstrates the level of respect and care for others. (you may pass notes, but must not speak when others are speaking).
- 6. Time limit will be strictly enforced. PLEASE make sure to pay attention to your air-time.

^{*}For cross-examine questions: 10-20 seconds to ask questions and 20-30 seconds to respond.
